After the Profile has been put into its final version and submitted to the Archdeacon he will then prepare a Role Description which can be advertised nationally.



Working from Rest by Canon Paul Hardingham

August sees many of us taking holidays to get some well-earned rest from working. But what is the biblical relationship between rest and work? The Bible shows us that we are to work from **rest**, **not rest from work**. How is this working out in our current experience?

When God created human beings on the 6th day, the next full day was a day of rest before the work began: 'Then God blessed the seventh day and made it holy, because on it He rested from all the work of creating that He had done.' (Genesis 2:3). Sunday is a day of rest at the beginning of the week.

Jesus lived out this rhythm of rest and work in His own ministry: 'Very early in the morning, Jesus got up and went off to a solitary place, where He prayed' He then told His disciples: 'Let us go somewhere else so that I can preach there also. That is why I have come.' (Mark 1:35-38).

Here is a rhythm for our own lives: 'I am the vine; you are the branches. If you remain in Me and I in you, you will bear much fruit' (John 15:5). Our work/fruitfulness arises out of the time we abide/ rest in Jesus. He will then show us what aspects of our lives need pruning: 'while every branch that does bear fruit He prunes so that it will be even more fruitful.' (2).

Let's use this month to reflect on how this pattern is working in our lives:

Are we spending enough time 'abiding' in Jesus?

Are we putting our energies into the right balance of rest and work?

Are there unproductive areas of our lives and churches that need pruning?

Remember God created us as human beings not just human doings!

The subject of Roy's talk:

The Importance of Faith

The Reading: Hebrews 11, verses 1-3, 8-16

- 1 Now faith is confidence in what we hope for and assurance about what we do not see.
- 2 This is what the ancients were commended for.
- 3 By faith we understand that the universe was formed at God's command, so that what is seen was not made out of what was visible.
- 8 By faith Abraham, when called to go to a place he would later receive as his inheritance, obeyed and went, even though he did not know where he was going.
- 9 By faith he made his home in the promised land like a stranger in a foreign country; he lived in tents, as did Isaac and Jacob, who were heirs with him of the same promise.
- 10 For he was looking forward to the city with foundations, whose architect and builder is God.
- 11 And by faith even Sarah, who was past childbearing age, was enabled to bear children because she considered him faithful who had made the promise.
- 12 And so from this one man, and he as good as dead, came descendants as numerous as the stars in the sky and as countless as the sand on the seashore.
- 13 All these people were still living by faith when they died. They did not receive the things promised; they only saw them and welcomed them from a distance, admitting that they were foreigners and strangers on earth.
- 14 People who say such things show that they are looking for a country of their own.
- 15 If they had been thinking of the country they had left, they would have had opportunity to return.
- 16 Instead, they were longing for a better country—a heavenly one. Therefore God is not ashamed to be called their God, for he has prepared a city for them.

The subject of Sally's talk:

Rahab's Faith

The Reading: Hebrews 11, verses 29-40

- 29 By faith the people passed through the Red Sea as on dry land; but when the Egyptians tried to do so, they were drowned.
- 30 By faith the walls of Jericho fell, after the army had marched around them for seven days.
- 31 By faith the prostitute Rahab, because she welcomed the spies, was not killed with those who were disobedient.
- 32 And what more shall I say? I do not have time to tell about Gideon, Barak, Samson and Jephthah, about David and Samuel and the prophets,
- 33 who through faith conquered kingdoms, administered justice, and gained what was promised; who shut the mouths of lions,
- 34 quenched the fury of the flames, and escaped the edge of the sword; whose weakness was turned to strength; and who became powerful in battle and routed foreign armies.
- 35 Women received back their dead, raised to life again. There were others who were tortured, refusing to be released so that they might gain an even better resurrection.
- 36 Some faced jeers and flogging, and even chains and imprisonment.
- 37 They were put to death by stoning; they were sawed in two; they were killed by the sword. They went about in sheepskins and goatskins, destitute, persecuted and mistreated—
- 38 the world was not worthy of them. They wandered in deserts and mountains, living in caves and in holes in the ground.
- 39 These were all commended for their faith, yet none of them received what had been promised,
- 40 since God had planned something better for us so that only together with us would they be made perfect.

The subject of Clive's talk:

Build Back Better

The Reading: Isaiah 58 verses 9 to 14

¹The LORD says, "Shout as loud as you can! Tell my people Israel about their sins! ²They worship me every day, claiming that they are eager to know my ways and obey my laws. They say they want me to give them just laws and that they take pleasure in worshipping me."

³The people ask, "Why should we fast if the LORD never notices? Why should we go without food if he pays no attention?"

The LORD says to them, "The truth is that at the same time as you fast, you pursue your own interests and oppress your workers. 4Your fasting makes you violent, and you quarrel and fight. Do you think this kind of fasting will make me listen to your prayers? 5When you fast, you make yourselves suffer; you bow your heads low like a blade of grass, and spread out sackcloth and ashes to lie on. Is that what you call fasting? Do you think I will be pleased with that?

⁶"The kind of fasting I want is this: remove the chains of oppression and the yoke of injustice, and let the oppressed go free. ⁷Share your food with the hungry and open your homes to the homeless poor. Give clothes to those who have nothing to wear, and do not refuse to help your own relatives.

⁸"Then my favour will shine on you like the morning sun, and your wounds will be quickly healed. I will always be with you to save you; my presence will protect you on every side. When you pray, I will answer you. When you call to

me, I will respond.

"If you put an end to oppression, to every gesture of contempt, and to every evil word; 10 if you give food to the hungry and satisfy those who are in need, then the darkness around you will turn to the brightness of noon. 11 And I will always guide you and satisfy you with good things. I will keep you strong and well. You will be like a garden that has plenty of water, like a spring of water that never runs dry. ¹²Your people will rebuild what has long been in ruins, building again on the old foundations. You will be known as the people who rebuilt the walls, who restored the ruined houses."

¹³The LORD says, "If you treat the Sabbath as sacred and do not pursue your own interests on that day; if you value my holy day and honour it by not travelling, working, or talking idly on that day, ¹⁴then you will find the joy that comes from serving me. 7 When he noticed how the guests picked the places of honour at the table, he told them this parable:


- 8 "When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take the place of honour, for a person more distinguished than you may have been invited.
- 9 If so, the host who invited both of you will come and say to you, 'Give this person your seat.' Then, humiliated, you will have to take the least important place.
- 10 But when you are invited, take the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he will say to you, 'Friend, move up to a better place.' Then you will be honoured in the presence of all the other quests.
- 11 For all those who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."
- 12 Then Jesus said to his host, "When you give a luncheon or dinner, do not invite your friends, your brothers or sisters, your relatives, or your rich neighbours; if you do, they may invite you back and so you will be repaid.
- 13 But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, the blind,
- 14 and you will be blessed. Although they cannot repay you, you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."




But it was not all eating and chatting. Oh no! There were games on the lawn. And what a competitive streak was shown by the athletes who took part.

The Rectory, St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren,

Your offer to bring in your team of church members, in order to make a house call on every home in our parish, was most generous. I do understand why you would need us to accommodate your team of 25 visitors, and then hold a residential training weekend for our own members of the team. I accept that we would have to produce a visiting pack listing all our church organisations, giving contact names and numbers and a short resume of what each group did, along with our mission statement and safeguarding policy. I also understand your suggestion that we include a supplement outlining our stewardship scheme.

Your plan that we should then hold an opening Service to which all the newcomers would be invited, and to which we might fly in a world-renowned speaker for the occasion, is understandable. And then of course we would need your help to set up a finance committee with budgets and organised fund raising. But what you seem to have missed is that our entire parish consists of something like 70 homes. They would not feel visited, but invaded.

Instead, I feel it would be best if we attempt something a little more low-key: an invitation to sherry after Matins, perhaps, where we could find out which of them plays golf and who may like to join the Bridge Club. Gradually, as the sherry flowed, we would also seek to discover who would be prepared to go on the brass cleaning, flower arranging and grass cutting rotas, which are the traditionally recognised signs of committed Christians, at least in this parish.

Inevitably, this means that none of our church members will be joining your team as you visit the residents of the new tower block in your parish. Most of our congregation abandoned attempting stairs some years ago and their polite enquiries about which Hunt the residents belong to, and where they stable their horses, may lead to a rather stilted conversation.

You are, of course, all prepared to welcome your new residents with enthusiasm, excitement, and frenetic activity; our policy of polite indifference and brief conversations about the weather should soon help ours to settle in in no time.

REVIVE INTERNATIONAL RESTORING LIVES, RENEWING HOPE

We have been making an annual donation to Revive International for several years to help them support abused and abandoned children, mainly girls, in Olinda in Brazil. Our Mission Partner there until last year was Andy Roberts. He now works for CMS in the UK but the work in Olinda continues. Revive's work in Brazil has grown significantly over the past 12 months with both houses running close to capacity and the newly formed fostering team training up their first foster families to begin the first ever fostering service in the city. The partnership with Living Waters Church has blossomed which has led to numerous activities happening throughout the week including discipleship through sports and martial arts classes for the youth, dance classes, and even a community market. There is great potential to expand this work to reach more families with the good news of Jesus and work to prevent children falling into abusive situations requiring their entry into the care system.

The call in action

St John's PCC decided at a recent meeting that we will continue to support CMS by requesting that our annual donation to their funds shall be used to assist the work of Marcio and Noemi who are based in Sao Paulo, Brazil.

The PCC recognised the important link between what Marcio and Noemi feel called to do (to make disciples of young adults) and the need to spread the Gospel in this country to young adults. Unless a new generation of people learns about Jesus there is a bleak long term future for Christianity both in Birkdale and throughout the UK.

Marcio and Noemi will be visiting Southport in September and will join us at our 10.30am Harvest Festival service on Sunday 24th September.

Readers of THE WORD are invited to attend at church on that day. Whilst we are always pleased to see that our services are being shared via zoom by those who live far away it would be great if we could have a large congregation in church on that day to meet Marcio and Noemi and to hear about their work.

WHY SUPPORT

MARCIO AND NOEMI


One of Church Mission Society's greatest strengths is our people. We believe all of God's people are called to God's mission. Some are called to be a faithful witness to Jesus where they are and some, like Marcio and Noemi, are called to share Jesus' love in word and deed overseas.

At Church Mission Society, we are excited by Marcio and Noemi's call and commitment to those beyond the reach of established church. People in Brazil are outwardly highly religious; 50 per cent define themselves as Catholic but only around five per cent are practising. 31 per cent are Evangelical, yet churches are dealing with massive challenges of nominalism, lack of Bible knowledge, and widespread prosperity theology. A further 10 per cent and counting define themselves as non-religious, many of whom have an aversion to traditional church, making them very difficult to reach with the gospel. Marcio and Noemi are ready to minister to and connect with people outside church, engaging with them in new and creative ways, sharing the gospel and making disciples as well as investing time in people's physical health. They are planning to do this through:


- applying CMS pioneer principles: seeing, imagining and dreaming while responding to the Holy Spirit in a new context and paving the way for others to do the same;
- connecting with people outside the church, developing outreach based on genuine relationships, with cultural relevance and meaningful spirituality adapted to the context;
 - building community and sharing biblical spiritual practices from dillerent Christian traditions to involve those that avoid church but are open to spirituality;
- helping to improve community health using Noemi's background as a nutritionist, possibly through classes, support groups and so on; partnering with the Brazilian Independent Presbyterian Church in the Du Park Project, in Indaiatuba's nature reserve;
- networking with other local church and community leaders with a similar vision, to encourage the practice of pioneer principles and





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Take a Chance by John M. Shakespeare

It is sometimes said that the only certainty in life is death, but hopefully we will have a good spell of living before we go to meet our maker. I would like to take a look at what our Chances are in getting satisfaction out of the life we live.

The American entertainer Oprah Winfrey (b 1954) says about the future we all face "Luck is preparation in making opportunity". I wonder what Harry and Meghan made of that! The notion that luck has a major part to play in the Chances we take, I believe can be taken as a given.

To quote from Ecclesiastes (Ch 11 verses 1-2) "Send out your bread upon the water, for after many days you will get it back. Divide your means seven ways or even eight, for you do not know what disaster may happen on earth". I believe that this message is all about being ready to go and do good turns, the Chance being that you will be of assistance to someone without expecting any reward. Very often we take Chances for selfish motives without considering the possible consequence. This quote says take the Chance to do good deeds now since we do not know what tomorrow will bring.

Theories of Probability are largely based on experience and the use of mathematics to forecast the frequency and therefore the Chances that the required or sought after result will occur. The Law of Averages is often cited as the gambler's fallacious thinking! However in a series of random events, there is no guarantee that any number will occur with a forecast probability to order.

I see as a rather cryptic comment on Chance, made in the play "Julius Caesar", by William Shakespeare (1564-1616), "There is a tide in the affairs of men, which taken at the flood leads to fortune". This is a speech by Brutus when talking to Cassius. It seems to me that Brutus means to say that the key to success is all in the timing. Chance is therefore recognising when the motivation for acting i.e. the tidal flow is right, in order to seize the opportunity for action.

The Laws of nature illustrate the Chances taken in our day to day activities. The plethora of environmentalists seen on our television programmes continue to astound me with their findings. The Chances of survival in today's world of nature, where climate change is being cited to explain so many occurrences, leads to the real possibilities of the extinction of some species. GOD in the Arts

The Revd Michael Burgess continues his series on God in the Arts with a look at 'The Transfiguration' by Fra Angelico. It is found in the Dominican convent of San Marco in Florence.

We behold the glory

TQ – Tingle Quotient – is the name given to those things that can produce a tingle down the spine or a frisson of excitement. It could be a piece of music or the sight of an evening sunset at sea or a newborn babe. We look, we hear, and what we look at or hear evokes a sense of wonder and amazement that has an almost physical effect on us. Something sublime unfolds before us producing delight and awe: a hint of glory that leads us to wonder and even to worship.

The monk who lived in cell no 6 at the Dominican convent of San Marco in Florence must have felt that when he entered his room and saw for the first time the fresco of the Transfiguration that Fra Angelico had painted. I am sure the sight would have stopped him in his



tracks, just as Peter, James and John were stopped in their tracks as they beheld their Lord transfigured before them on the mount.

From 1436 Fra Angelico painted a whole series of frescoes for the convent from the High Altar to the Chapter House to the cells of the monks. Here in cell no 6 there is a restrained simplicity and directness about the Transfiguration. One of the three disciples looks out towards us, while the other two are caught up in wonder and awe as they look on Jesus with the faces of Moses and Elijah on either side.

Here Fra Angelico is not seeking to impress a wealthy patron: he is providing a focus for devotion and prayer for the monks of his community. The scene speaks to us of that sense of awe and reverence. On 6th August we celebrate the feast of the Transfiguration. The Gospel accounts relate that special moment of revelation to the inner group of disciples. The glory shown to them evoked a sense of wonder and marvel, but also a sense of loss. For the glory proved elusive and just out of human reach. The moment of revelation passed, and the disciples had to go down the mount again to meet the crying needs of the world, all but forgotten when they were with their Lord on the mountain top.

The monk in his cell would ponder the glory of Fra Angelico's fresco, knowing that he would be called from his cell to take up his monastic duties. But the painting would go with him to sustain and nurture his life. It is the same with us: we have moments of glory. But they pass, and we must return to our daily lives. As we look on this month's painting, we sense that glory and wonder which can sustain us through life. As Thomas Jones says in his poem on this episode:

Like a pearl we hold Close to our hearts what we have heard and seen.

Keeping Calm In The Storm

One of the most famous stories about Jesus is the calming of the storm (Luke 8:22-25). Of course, anyone could say that the wind stopped suddenly of its own accord, but the disciples were not fooled. They had seen a number of these 'coincidences' in Jesus' ministry, and they weren't about to ignore this one. Jesus had calmed the waves with only His words. Wasn't this an act of God? Who else could be in complete control of creation?

Jesus dealt graciously with the very pressing and practical issue of the raging storm before He did a bit of teaching, asking His followers "Where is your faith?" It's not surprising that they were scared, given the circumstances, but clearly Jesus expected better of them. He had already been teaching them for some time, and clearly knew they were ready to trust Him.



In similar circumstances, Christians often do several things in quick succession. We start by panicking and being afraid. After a while we might remember what we know about God's character and pray for help, trusting that whatever happens He will help us to handle it. Most often, we don't get the storm-calming effect when we ask for it, but battling on with faith and God's help is much easier than trying to keep going in a panic.

'Peace' in this kind of situation is a very active holding on to what we know about God. The difference between trusting and not trusting can be like night and day in terms of stress levels. I have found that it can make the difference between unmanageable stress and something that stretches me and teaches me something new.

Knowing some science can help us to trust God. A Being who created the whole universe, sustaining the wonderfully creative processes that produced diverse life on earth, must be both extremely powerful and extremely wise. The God who can both calm the waves and walk on them must be in complete control of the things He made. When this knowledge goes hand in hand with experience of God's intimate love for us and care for us in every situation that we find ourselves in, I am reassured that He's got things in hand. I will always need help from others to pray faithfully in stormy situations, but hopefully I've seen enough now not to panic for too long.

Time (and my closest friends) will tell!

Ukrainian soldiers treat Bible like 'a life-saver'

Since the war broke out more than six months ago, Bible Society has been making the Bible available to soldiers as well as civilians in Ukraine.

Recently, Serhii, the commander of a military unit, told Bible Society colleagues in Ukraine how vital the Bible is to his troops. He said, "It is very important for soldiers to have the Bible. Things are very tough at times and many soldiers are praying to God.

"They may have never attended a church before. They may not have believed in God before. But now they are turning to Him. Many of them treat the Bible as a life-saver.

"I have a friend, an officer. He also received a Bible from our chaplain. Sometimes he faces situations that seem to be desperate. He turns to the Bible....and he says, 'You wouldn't believe it. Every time I find an answer. The Bible has a way out! I do as the Bible says and everything works well."

Serhii added, "So, for those people who are facing enormous pressures on the frontlines, who experience hardship, both physical and moral, when they have this Bible in their pocket, when it gets very hard, a soldier can open it and find words that he needs to hear at that very moment. It is very important. Thank you!"
