#### **OUR CHURCH**



Our Church has been in need of a Spring Cleaning for a long time. Two years of covid stop-go lockdowns had an effect. The window ledges were thick with sand and dust, the pews were in need of being wiped down and dusted, and our hymn books and pew Bibles which have been sitting on the floor under the pews needed to be cleaned and repositioned. There were lots of cobwebs which gave the church an uncared-for appearance.

The notice boards were cluttered and the tables at the back of the church were an untidy collection of flyers, lists, charity envelopes and the like. Many of the kneelers had come adrift from their fastenings at the back of the pews.

During May much work has been done to make the church tidier and cleaner. Our congregations might not notice this if they do not pay

attention to the state of the church but many hours of work have been done. Our readers are invited to look at the notice boards in the porch (there may even be something of interest to you!) and see how neatly they are now arranged. Look, too, at the tables at the back of the church.

Sally Wright has repaired the hangers on many embroidered kneelers and Tim replaced the broken hooks so that all our kneelers now hang neatly at the back of each pew.

And if you see a cobweb: please tell the wardens!

Our PCC is making good progress in preparing the Parish Profile which is part of the procedure in seeking the appointment of a new Vicar to the parish. We do not know how long that process will take, but we want to be ready for it, and we want Our Church to be presentable and attractive to any applicants. Last year the outside of the church was redecorated, and repairs were carried out to parts of the interior. The grounds are well looked after and our church hall is in good condition.

There are still a few items of repair which will have to be looked into but the PCC is keeping on top of what needs to be done. If you have not been back to church since we reopened, come and see for yourself!

#### Refreshments after the Sunday Services


It's been pleasing to see that some of our congregation have stayed behind after the Sunday morning services and our monthly midweek communion services recently to have a coffee or tea and a chat.



#### Nigerian Water Project

Our readers will recall that St John's is collecting voluntary donations to assist with the cost of sinking a bore hole in a village in Nigeria to obtain water from deep underground.

We all take the supply of drinking water for granted but for many people in Africa clean water is not readily available. Roy Doran's link with a village community in Nigeria has brought this to our attention.



The response so far has been very generous and our congregation has given, or committed itself to giving, £752 up to the date of going to print.

The cost of the project will be about £1,240. So we are still nearly £500 short of the target.

There are so many requests for charitable donations at the current time and in the difficult economic climate in which we live that there comes a time when we may all want to give but feel unable to do so.

But if anyone feels able to make any further contributions to this project please give them (preferably in cash, and in a marked envelope clearly indicating that the gift is for the Nigerian Water Project) by not later than the end of June.

# The subject of Roy's talk:

#### The Day of Pentecost

#### The Reading: Acts 2, 1-21

1. When the day of Pentecost had come, they were all together in one place. 2 And suddenly from heaven there came a sound like the rush of a violent wind, and it filled the entire house where they were sitting. 3 Divided tongues, as of fire, appeared among them, and a tongue rested on each of them. 4 All of them were filled with the Holy Spirit and began to speak in other languages, as the Spirit gave them ability. 5 Now there were devout Jews from every people under heaven living in Jerusalem. 6 And at this sound the crowd gathered and was bewildered, because each one heard them speaking in the native language of each. 7 Amazed and astonished, they asked, "Are not all these who are speaking Galileans? 8 And how is it that we hear, each of us, in our own native language? 9 Parthians, Medes, Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, 10 Phrygia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the parts of Libya belonging to Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jews and proselytes, 11 Cretans and Arabs - in our own languages we hear them speaking about God's deeds of power." 12 All were amazed and perplexed, saying to one another, "What does this mean?" 13 But others sneered and said, "They are filled with new wine." 14 But Peter, standing with the eleven, raised his voice and addressed them, "Fellow Jews and all who live in Jerusalem, let this be known to you, and listen to what I say. 15 Indeed, these are not drunk, as you suppose, for it is only nine o'clock in the morning. 16 No, this is what was spoken through the prophet Joel:

17 'In the last days it will be, God declares, that I will pour out my Spirit upon all flesh, and your sons and your daughters shall prophesy, and your young men shall see visions, and your old men shall dream dreams.

18 Even upon my slaves, both men and women, in those days I will pour

out my Spirit, and they shall prophesy.

19 And I will show portents in the heaven above and signs on the earth below, blood, and fire, and smoky mist.

20 The sun shall be turned to darkness and the moon to blood, before the coming of the Lord's great and glorious day.

21 Then everyone who calls on the name of the Lord shall be saved.'

#### **Choose Joy**

#### The Reading: Habakkuk 3, 2-19

- 2 O Lord, I have heard of your renown, and I stand in awe, O Lord, of your work. In our own time revive it; in our own time make it known; in wrath may you remember mercy.
- 3 God came from Teman, the Holy One from Mount Paran. His glory covered the heavens, and the earth was full of his praise.
- 4 The brightness was like the sun; rays came forth from his hand, where his power lay hidden.
- 5 Before him went pestilence, and plague followed close behind.
- 6 He stopped and shook the earth; he looked and made the nations tremble. The eternal mountains were shattered; along his ancient pathways the everlasting hills sank low.
- 7 I saw the tents of Cushan under affliction; the tent-curtains of the land of Midian trembled.

#### **Beware All Donations!**

The Rectory, St James the Least of All

My dear Nephew Darren,

This has been an unusual month: we have moved from hysterical excitement to deep disappointment within the space of days.

For many years, our vestry has displayed an oil painting generously donated by the Dowager Duchess of Stansby - given to us, I suspect, because her son, the tenth Duke, would not allow it in his house. It was supposed to depict Daniel in the lions' den, although I always thought it looked more like a prospective adopter visiting a dog rescue centre. The Dowager was less than pleased when it wasn't made the centrepiece in the sanctuary, but we managed to persuade her that her exceptional work of art would be safer from theft if locked away.

Pentecost took place on the wellestablished Jewish festival of First Fruits, which was observed at the beginning of the wheat harvest. It was seven weeks after Easter, or 50 days including Easter.

A feast day to celebrate the country's wheat harvest does not sound exactly world-changing, but that year, it became one of the most important days in world history. For Pentecost was the day that Jesus sent the Holy Spirit – the day the Church was born.



Jesus had told His disciples that something big was going to happen, and that they were to wait for it in Jerusalem, instead of returning to Galilee. Jesus had plans for His disciples, but He knew they could not do the work themselves. They would need His help.

And so, they waited in Jerusalem, praying together with His other followers, for many days. And then on that fateful morning there was suddenly the sound as of a mighty rushing wind. Tongues of flame flickered on their heads, and they began to praise God in many tongues, to the astonishment of those who heard them. The curse of Babel (Genesis 11: 1-9) was dramatically reversed that morning.

That morning the Holy Spirit came to indwell the disciples and followers of Jesus. The Church was born. The Christians were suddenly full of life and power, utterly different from their former fearful selves. The change in them was permanent.

Peter gave the first ever sermon of the Christian Church that morning, proclaiming Jesus was the Messiah. His boldness in the face of possible death was in marked contrast to the man who had denied Jesus 50 days before. And 3,000 people responded, were converted, and were baptised. How's that for fast church growth!

Of course, Pentecost was not the first time the Holy Spirit had acted in this world. All through the Old Testament there are accounts of how God's Spirit guided people and strengthened them. But now, because of Christ's death and resurrection, He could INDWELL them. From now on, every Christian could have the confidence that Jesus was with them constantly, through the indwelling of His Holy Spirit.

#### 21<sup>st</sup> June Summer Solstice, longest day of the year

June is the month of the summer solstice, the month of the Sun. Sol + stice come from two Latin words meaning 'sun' and 'to stand still'. As the days lengthen, the sun rises higher and higher until it seems to stand still in the sky. The Summer Solstice results in the longest day and the shortest night of the year. The Northern Hemisphere celebrates in June, and the Southern Hemisphere celebrates in December.



The current war in Ukraine may remind us of an earlier conflict in which Russia was involved in hostilities with the Ottoman Empire and in which Britain became involved.

Dennis Davis has carried out some research into one of this country's Victorian iconic characters and he has kindly submitted this article:

#### The Lady with the Lamp

1853 saw the start of the Crimean war when Russia tried to expand into the Ottoman Empire. Britain and France went to the aid of the Ottoman Empire in 1854. The main scene of action was in the Crimea. Britain was ill-prepared for this war. Mr Sidney Herbert, Secretary of State for War and another minister went to visit the troops and were appalled by what they found. The troops were worn out, their uniforms patched or in tatters, some had no shoes, they were filthy and unshaven; one had worn the same clothes for nearly two years, others had made smocks from blankets.

There was no provision of any medical equipment for the sick or wounded, and there was mismanagement, over crowding, ill treatment, cruelty and neglect. The injured men were cared for in an old Turkish barracks with no hygiene, and sanitary facilities were overflowing. Cholera was rife.

The news of this at home caused an outcry. The Army was obstructive and thought that some of the camp followers could be taught to care for the wounded. It was thought that women made the best nurses, some thought the soldiers' wives would be suitable to care for the lightly wounded. Others thought that Nuns would be best suited.

Mr Herbert looked for a suitable person to take charge of a party of nurses to go to the Crimea. Mr Herbert's wife suggested there was one eminent and willing person. A young Lady by the name of Florence Nightingale was chosen; she had some practical experience in nursing on the continent and of hospital management. She believed that she had a calling from God to help the sick.

The first 38 young ladies selected by Miss Nightingale, included 10 Catholic Sisters of Charity.

The conditions they found shocked them, but they had been taught the importance of hygiene, basic nursing care and the need for fluids. Their first

task was to clean the wards. She found her patience and firmness would be severely tested due to obstruction by the military.

Her popularity was borne out in letters home as troops sang her praises. One wrote, "In the silence of the night, often would be seen the slender form gliding noiselessly through the wards and corridors with her lamp. Every poor fellow's face softens with gratitude at the sight of her." The Lady with the Lamp.

She went on to found the first proper Nurse Training at St Thomas's Hospital, London and established the standards of nursing that are still applied today.

Florence Nightingale was a local heroine in my native Derbyshire where she and her family lived for some time.

My Great Grandmother, Jane Somner, nee Munday, 1833-1933 lived at Windsor. On the celebration of her 100th birthday she was interviewed by a reporter from a Sheffield newspaper and made the following comments: "Oh what joy and celebrations we had with street parties to welcome home the soldiers from the Crimea".

#### What 6000 steps a day can do for you

A recent study has found that doing 6000 steps a day can reduce your risk of an early death, if you are aged over 60. People under the age of 60 should aim for between 8000 and 10,000 steps a day.

However, taking more than 8000 steps a day has no particular benefit, and the oftrepeated mantra that everyone should take 10,000 step a day has no grounding whatever in science. (The 10,000 steps idea came from a 1964 Japanese marketing drive to sell pedometers!)

Researchers from the University of Massachusetts Amherst point out that: "Steps are very simple to track, and there is a rapid growth of fitness-tracking devices."

The major thing to remember is that there is a "lot of evidence suggesting that moving, even a little more, is beneficial, particularly for those who are doing very little activity."

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
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







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#### CATHEDRALS OF EUROPE

Cathedrals have stood for Christianity in Europe since the 12th century and earlier. As beacons of faith for Christians they have arisen, despite religious and political wars, and still stand today in all their glory.

Cologne Cathedral (The Cathedral Church of St Peter) ... is the seat of the Archbishop of Cologne in Germany. At 515 feet high it is the tallest church in the world with twin spires as well as being the largest Gothic church in northern Europe. It was built in the 13th century on the site of an earlier Roman temple. During a period of excavation work two 6th century graves were discovered. One was a boy with a richly adorned grave. The other was a



woman, believed to have been Wisigard, a 6th century Frankish queen. The cathedral also houses a reliquary (a container of Holy Relics) from the Crusades. During World War II the cathedral suffered bomb damage, and the repairs were not finally completed until 1956.



St Stephen's Cathedral, Vienna ... is more commonly known by its German title "Stephansdom". It is the seat of the Archbishop of Vienna. The Romanesque and Gothic structure seen today was proposed by Duke Rudolf IV. The site is actually situated on the ruins of an earlier church and an ancient Roman cemetery. The main entrance, "The Giant's Door", and the two towers, "The Pagan Towers", were constructed from some

of the debris from the earlier church. During World War II the cathedral was saved from intentional destruction at the hands of the retreating German forces by a Captain in the Wehrmacht who disobeyed orders to fire 100 shells to reduce the cathedral to rubble. (Editor's note: unhappily, it is recorded history that the roof and many timbers were destroyed by fire which was started by civilians when the Russian army invaded Vienna and which accidentally spread to the cathedral). Inside the cathedral is the tomb of Emperor Frederick III.

**Stockholm Cathedral** (Storkyrkan, which means the Great Church) ... is the seat of the Bishop of Stockholm. Inaugurated in 1306 and dedicated to St Nicholas the cathedral was enlarged during the 14th and 15th centuries. After the Reformation it became a place in which Mass in the Catholic

tradition was celebrated in the Swedish language instead of in Latin. Later it became a Lutheran church not dedicated to any saint. Amongst its important works of art are a life-size sculpture of St George and the Dragon, and a painting, "Vädersolstavlan" (The Sun Dogs painting) which shows one of the earliest images of Stockholm. Used for coronations of the Swedish Royal Family it recently celebrated the wedding in 2010 of the Crown Princess Victoria and Daniel Westling.





The Cathedral of Notre-Dame de Paris ... is situated on the Ile de la Cité, an island in the River Seine. In 1160 the Bishop of Paris, Maurice de Sully, began building a church which was larger and better suited to the growing population of Paris than the previous church had been. The Cathedral was consecrated to the Virgin Mary and is reputed to be one of the finest examples of French Gothic architecture. In December 1431 the "boy king" Henry VII of England was crowned King of France in the cathedral at the age of 10. A fountain was added to the cathedral in 1625 to provide the Paris population with a supply of running water. It was nationalised in 1789 as part of the French Revolution and was the place in which Napoleon Bonaparte was crowned Emperor. Under the Concordat in 1801 use of the cathedral was returned to the Roman Catholic Church but ownership remained with the State. The condition of the cathedral deteriorated and required extensive repair. The story of "The Hunchback of

Notre Dame" by Victor Hugo in 1831 raised awareness of the decaying state of the building and some years later led to major restorations taking place. The Allied victory of the liberation of Paris in 1944 was celebrated by the singing of The Magnificat in the Cathedral. It remains today as a symbol of Christianity in France.

Cathedrals stand throughout Europe to proclaim faith in God. Wise words from theologian John H Newman, (1801-1890) remind us "We can believe what we choose. We are answerable for what we choose to believe."

Editor's Footnote: On 15 April 2019 fire broke out beneath the roof of the Notre-Dame cathedral. The spire collapsed, most of the roof was destroyed, and the upper walls were severely damaged. Extensive damage to the interior was prevented by its stone vaulted ceiling, which largely contained the burning roof as it collapsed. Many works of art and religious relics were moved to safety early in the emergency, but others suffered smoke damage, and some of the exterior art was damaged or destroyed. French president Emmanuel Macron said that the cathedral would be restored by 2024, and launched a fundraising campaign which brought in pledges of over €1 billion as of 22 April 2019. It is thought by some that a complete restoration could take twenty years or more.

#### GOD in the Arts

The Revd Michael Burgess continues his series on God in the Arts with a look at the Book of Kells

#### The Thread of God's love

In 563 an Irish monk was forced to leave his homeland because of a conflict that had led to a misuse of power and even bloodshed. On Pentecost Sunday he arrived on the island of Iona off the north-west coast of Scotland with twelve companions. There he began a new way of life, founded on Christ's mercy and forgiveness of the past, and so created one of the great centres of faith and mission in the Christian Church. His name was Columba, and we keep his feast day on 9<sup>th</sup> June.

His monastery on Iona started as a small cluster of wooden buildings with a church and a guesthouse. Around were fields of crops and cattle and bees. But under Columba's guidance, it grew, and from Iona



monks were sent into Scotland as one arm of a missionary advance that reached down through England to France and across Europe.

That outreach was an amazing achievement. But just as amazing was the consolidation of monastic life on Iona that resulted two centuries later in the Book of Kells. This text of the four Gospels was begun by scribes and artists in the library of Iona. It grew into one of the masterpieces of Celtic art that was taken to Kells in Ireland to escape the Viking invaders who ravaged the island.

Along with the text of the Gospels, there are illustrations of Jesus, Mary and the four evangelists, together with decorations at once intricate and fantastic: patterns that interweave and interlace across the page with an odd face here and a weird creature there. The design is in brilliant detail, and you can follow the lines as they weave in and out. This delight in patterns is evident in lots of Celtic art.

It is good to imagine Columba on Iona meditating on the thread of God's grace woven into his life as he looked back to his years in Ireland and his pilgrimage to Iona. It might have seemed at one glance a complicated interweaving of events and experiences, and then perhaps as he looked again, he would see God's love threading its way through that history and redeeming both it and him.

It is the same for us. As we look at our lives, they may seem complex and involved patterns of events and circumstances taking us here and there. As we ponder those patterns, then we can begin to see a thread woven into the patterns that guides and leads us on. And as we stand back, all the patterns and threads seem to make sense as we spot that guiding thread. Just as we can stand back from the designs of this page and see God's love spelling out the name of Christ, our Lord.

#### What Does the Holy Spirit Do?

As we celebrate Pentecost this month, it's appropriate to ask the question: what does the Holy Spirit do in our lives? Everybody who has committed their life to Christ possesses the Holy Spirit, 'if anyone does not have the Spirit of Christ, he does not belong to Christ.' (Romans 8:9). It is the Spirit who brings us new birth into the family of God.

The Spirit assures us of God's love and acceptance, despite our fears, doubts or failures. As adopted children we can address God as our father: "God sent the Spirit of his Son into our hearts, the Spirit who calls out, 'Abba, Father.'" (Galatians 4: 6). By using the same word used by Jesus, we can grow in intimacy with our Father and pray to Him, especially when we struggle to find the right words.



The Holy Spirit is committed to producing a family likeness in those who follow Christ. This Jesus likeness enables us to live as Jesus would in our place, ie: work, family, time, interests etc. Paul describes this as the fruit of the Spirit: 'love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control.' (Galatians 5:22,23). He talks about fruit not fruits! We can't pick and choose, as they come as a total package to be developed over a lifetime!

The Spirit is committed to producing new desires for God: reading the Bible and praying, forgiving others, meeting with other Christians and sharing our faith. He will also give us the motivation to overcome wrong habits, attitudes or lifestyle in our lives.

'Let the church return to Pentecost, and Pentecost will return to her. The Spirit of God cannot take possession of believers beyond their capacity of receiving Him' (Andrew Murray).

#### Help, my kids just asked me a science question!

#### Why aren't dinosaurs in the Bible?

The Bible wasn't written to list all the animals on earth or tell us about science. It was written a long time before people started to use science to learn about the world.

When the Bible was written, people didn't even have a word for dinosaurs yet! But it's not just dinosaurs that aren't mentioned in the Bible, it doesn't talk about armadillos, kangaroos, sabre-toothed cats or penguins either!



That doesn't mean that the Bible is out of date or wrong, or that these animals aren't important. Rather than teaching us science, many Christians believe that the Bible was written to tell people about God, how much He loves them, and all the amazing things He has done.

The Bible says that God made everything, and loves everything He made, so that includes dinosaurs. It also encourages people to explore and find out all about the wonderful things it says God has made. Science is a part of this exploration.

#### Did God make the dinosaurs?

The Bible (the holy book that Christians read) says that God made everything. All the stars, the Earth and all the amazing plants and animals that have ever lived here. So yes, most Christians believe that God made the dinosaurs!

The Bible also teaches that God loves it when people explore His creation, and science is a great way of doing that. So, for many Christians, science is one of the fun things we can use to learn all about *how* God made everything, including all of the dinosaurs!

#### Were humans and dinosaurs ever living on earth at the same time?

#### Ukrainian church leaders urge people to pray

A senior church leader in Ukraine has told the citizens that Russia's war on Ukraine "did not begin with missiles and bombs – it began with deception, untruth and lies." So says the head of Ukraine's independent Orthodox Church, Metropolitan Epiphany (Dumenko).

"The Lord is now showing us how we must resist with the testimony of truth. Evil is evil, not just an alternative viewpoint, and war is war, not just some conflict. Rapists, looters and murderers are criminals, and what they are perpetuating is a genocide of the Ukrainian people."

The Metropolitan also said that Ukrainians knew that Russia had long had "evil plans to restore the tyranny of a rotten, overthrown empire."

But, he said "The Lord is with us in this struggle, because we are fighting for truth and goodness against demonic tyranny and resentment.... We believe that our people will overcome all new challenges – that Ukraine will win its victory."

Meanwhile, the Primate of Ukraine's Greek Catholic Church, Major Archbishop Sviatoslav Shevchuk of Kyiv-Halych, said that this Spring and Summer may well be the last for many, including himself.

He went on: "As the war escalates, and the enemy intensifies its offensive against Ukraine, I call on everyone to pray vigorously and tirelessly for the Ukrainian army, because the fate of Ukraine and the world is now being decided."

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
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




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
