News from Andy and Rose Roberts

We returned to Brazil over the summer and it was fantastic to be back at Revive and see all the progress the team are making. When we opened the new home three years



ago, we knew that we would be eating into our reserves to cover the extra expenses and we promised that one day we would transition this home into a fostering service so that children could be cared for in families rather in institutions. That day is approaching - thanks to Revive's work, fostering is now legal, a service has been launched and the first ever foster families are being trained up. However, the fostering service isn't ready yet to transition the second home and our reserves are beginning to run dry.

Could you please prayerfully consider supporting the work of Revive so that we can continue restoring lives and renewing hope amongst children in Olinda and fulfil, with God's help, our promise of providing family-based care for the city? We are so close and, now more than ever, need your help to continue what we do.

STOP PRESS: After 4 years of work Revive has now placed their first child into a foster family. Their social worker and their psychologist introduced Dona Claudia to Matthew, a 5-year-old little boy. He is now settling in to foster family life, as the Revive team works with his biological family to work towards a healthy re-integration. The team is also working hard to find more foster families, by visiting schools, churches and medical clinics speaking about this new service and distributing flyers. Our next foster parent training course will start in January. Thank you so much for all your prayers in the last few years.

And fresh water!!





Worshippers at St John's will be very pleased to know that their donations to the appeal to help a Nigerian community sink a borehole in search of fresh water have been rewarded because very soon after the funds were transferred to Nigeria work commenced and it has resulted in fresh water being brought from deep underground.

More than 1,500 people will benefit from this project!

We are so fortunate in the UK to be able to turn a tap and receive clean water without us even having to think about where it comes from, how it is delivered, or why it is immediately drinkable. Imagine what it would be like to have to walk miles to a standpipe and then have to boil water to make it drinkable. That is what millions of people have to do in many parts of the world.

We thank God that by providing £1,000 to a rural community in Nigeria the people of St John's Church have helped them to dig deep enough into the earth to find a source of clean water. Although the people have to carry the water away in buckets, which seems somewhat primitive by Western standards, they now have fresh water near to their homes, on tap! What a change that may make to their lives. Just look at the smiles on the faces of the children as they collect clean water.







The Vicar of St Andrew's church in the Alade Idanre community has written to us:

"The neighbourhood started fetching water today. There is an adage in Africa that he who brings water bring life, thanks for bringing life. The congregation of St Andrew's Anglican Church Alade Idanre is grateful to St John's Birkdale, God bless you all."

So often, when we make a charitable donation, we do not know what happens to our gift or what good it will actually do. But everyone who contributed to this appeal will be pleased to see how their gifts have had such an immediate and beneficial effect.

Dennis Davis remembers an old Hymn



As we approach Christmas once again our minds go back to family and friends.

When looking through my old Church of Ireland Hymn book I found a Hymn that I remembered from my first Christmas in N Ireland. This short Hymn was sung at the Christmas Carol service and has remained in my mind ever since, indeed I sang it to patients at their Christmas parties on several occasions.

The words are taken from "The Christmas Oratorio" by Bach in 1734. It was sung to a tune called Luther, Wittenburg 1536 and written for the Christmas season. This may have been written by Paul Gerhardt, a famous author of evangelical Hymns. Bach used Lutheran Hymns and tunes from time to time.

May I share the lyrics with you? Should you wish to hear it you could go on "YouTube"

"Beside thy cradle here I stand
O thou that ever livest
And bring thee with a willing hand,
The very gifts thou givest
Accept me, tis my mind my heart,
My soul, my strength, my every part,
That thou from me requirest."

The Meaning of '12 Days of Christmas'

What do leaping lords, French hens, swimming swans, and especially the partridge who won't come out of the pear tree have to do with Christmas?

From 1558 until 1829, Roman Catholics in England were not permitted to practice their faith openly. Someone during that era wrote this carol as a catechism song for young Catholics. It has two levels of meaning: the surface meaning plus a hidden meaning known only to members of their church. Each element in the carol has a code word for a religious reality which the children could remember.



- 1. The partridge in a pear tree was Jesus Christ.
- 2. Two turtle doves were the Old and New Testaments.
- 3. Three French hens stood for faith, hope and love.
- 4. The four calling birds were the four gospels of Matthew, Mark, Luke and John.
- 5. The five golden rings recalled the Torah or Law, the first five books of the Old Testament.
- 6. The six geese a-laying stood for the six days of creation.
- 7. Seven swans a-swimming represented the sevenfold gifts of the Holy Spirit: Prophesy, Serving, Teaching, Exhortation, Contribution, Leadership, and Mercy.
- 8. The eight maids a-milking were the eight beatitudes.
- 9. Nine ladies dancing were the nine fruits of the Holy Spirit: Love, Joy, Peace, Patience, Kindness, Goodness, Faithfulness, Gentleness, and Self Control.
- 10. The ten lords a-leaping were the ten commandments.
- 11. The eleven pipers piping stood for the eleven faithful disciples.
- 12. The twelve drummers drumming symbolized the twelve points of belief in the Apostles' Creed.

It's been a topsy turvy year for me, some lovely times, but others I would rather forget. But above all my family have been with me every step of the way. How lucky I am to have them either near me or far away, making sure I am alright on a daily basis. So I thank God every day that I've been blessed with them all.

Although it is lovely here I find it hard to be able to go to a church service, without a car. It is hard as I live at the top of a road which is a mile long and is very steep. I have made enquiries about having a lift to the local church, but very few people go anymore and those who do have a full car. So it's so important for me to be on Zoom with you all. We have a minibus that takes us into Ilkley twice a week, but not on Sundays.

I miss the activities within a church group, although I'm lucky there are plenty of things available to be involved in here each week. The Christmas festivities start at the beginning of December, but unfortunately not involving any religious service. Our retired Vicar usually has an afternoon service with carols and readings which I liked last year, but her lovely husband Brian has dementia and she is finding it hard enough concentrating her time to him, so she has cancelled it this year.

I have made lots of new friends here, and one lady in particular who is lovely, her name is Nora. It's amazing to find out the different reasons for people making this village their home. Over 100 people live here, and I've only met half of them. We are mainly people on our own and most are ladies, and just a few men. The rest are couples mainly in their seventies who have down-sized for their retirement, and to have the comforts of this lovely complex. God brought me here and I am happy.

I wish you all a wonderful Christmas and, most importantly, a Healthy and Happy New Year. 2023. None of us knows what tomorrow or next year will have in store for us all, but God knows, he has plans for all of us. We just have to keep listening and praying.

God Bless to you all. Have a wonderful Christmas Fair, and just keep up all the good work you do for church and the community. Thank you. So from Ilkley December 2022, I'll write again in 2023, it will be my 90

birthday in June, I would like you to come to celebrate with me, God willing.

GOD in the Arts

The Revd Michael Burgess continues his series on God in the Arts with a look at the cartoon for 'The Mackintosh Madonna', which normally hangs in the British Museum.

Preparing the Way

This month's drawing is 'The Virgin and Child' by Raphael (1483-1520). Raphael was a talented artist from a very early age, but this drawing belongs to a time when he was in Rome from 1510-12. The finished painting is known as the Mackintosh Madonna, after its last owner.

This drawing, or cartoon, was the first stage in creating that work: it is in black chalk with heightening marks of white. When an artist made an initial drawing like this, he would then prick the cartoon with holes and then sprinkle charcoal powder over the drawing to reproduce the design on the canvas below. The pinholes on this drawing are still clearly visible. Sadly the final painting has been damaged through time, but here in the cartoon we see that first stage: a sensitive and balanced picture of mother and child: Mary warm and caring, Jesus laughing and alive.



During Advent we think of the preparations God made for the birth of the Saviour. We celebrate God's work of creation and how He chose a people for His own. Within that people He looked for a holy remnant and then finally a loving heart in the assent of Mary to be the mother of our Lord. These preparatory steps were as vital for our salvation as the artist moving from idea to sketch to the finished work.

Each stage is important; each stage a revelation of life and love. Vasari wrote of Raphael that in his paintings 'the flesh palpitates, the breath comes and goes, every organ lives, and life pulsates everywhere.' Even this preliminary drawing displays that life and vitality. It is a life we celebrate at Christmas in the birth of a child who turns to us, as he does in this work, as a sign of joy and love.



The Romantic poet John Keats, who wrote the despondent poem "Ode on Melancholy" and who died of tuberculosis at the young age 25 may not have been the life and soul of every party but he is recorded as having told a joke. He said to a friend "I take my yellow peas to Chiswick." His friend asked "Why?" Keats replied "It's the way to

Turnham Green." Ho ho.

His friend and lugubrious fellow poet William Wordsworth, who clearly did not know geography or who had no sense of humour, was so impressed by the joke that he waited for an occasion to try it out. "I take my yellow peas to Chiswick," he said, and when he was asked "Why?" he replied "It's the way to Hounslow." He should have stuck to Daffodils!





The History of Christmas

The Bible does not give a date for the birth of Jesus. In the third century it was suggested that Jesus was conceived at the Spring equinox, 25th March, popularising the belief that He was born nine months later on 25th December.

John Chrysostom, the Archbishop of Constantinople, encouraged Christians worldwide to make Christmas a holy day in about 400.

In the early Middle Ages, Christians celebrated a series of midwinter holy days. Epiphany (which recalls the visit to the infant Jesus of the wise men bearing gifts) was the climax of 12 days of Christmas, beginning on 25th December.

The Emperor Charlemagne chose 25th December for his coronation in 800, and the prominence of Christmas Day rose. In England, William the Conqueror also chose 25th December for his coronation in 1066, and the date became a fixture both for religious observance and feasting. Cooking a boar was a common feature of mediaeval Christmas feasts, and singing carols accompanied it. Writers of the time lament the fact that the true significance of Christmas was being lost because of partying. They condemn the rise of 'misrule' – drunken dancing and promiscuity. The day was a public holiday, and traditions of bringing evergreen foliage into the house and the exchange of gifts (usually on Epiphany) date from this time.

In the 17th century the rise of new Protestant denominations led to a rejection of many celebrations that were associated with Catholic Christianity. Christmas was one of them. After the execution of Charles I, England's Puritan rulers made the celebration of Christmas illegal for 14 years. The restoration of Charles II ended the ban, but religious leaders continued to discourage excess, especially in Scotland. In Western Europe (but not worldwide) the day for exchanging gifts changed from Epiphany (6th January) to Christmas Day.

By the 1820s, there was a sense that the significance of Christmas was declining. Charles Dickens was one of several writers who sought to restore it. His novel A Christmas Carol was significant in reviving merriment during the festival. He emphasised charity and family reunions, alongside religious observance. Christmas trees, paper chains, cards and many well-known carols date from this time. So did the tradition of Boxing Day, on 26th December, when tradesmen who had given reliable service during the year would collect 'boxes' of money or gifts from their customers.

In Europe Santa Claus is the figure associated with the bringing of gifts. Santa Claus is a shortening of the name of Saint Nicholas, who was a Christian bishop in the fourth century in present-day Turkey. He was particularly noted for his care for children and for his generosity to the poor. By the Middle Ages his appearance, in red bishop's robes and a mitre, was adored in the Netherlands and familiar across Europe.

Father Christmas dates from 17th century England, where he was a secular figure of good cheer (more associated with drunkenness than gifts). The transformation of Santa Claus into today's Father Christmas started in New York in the 1880s, where his red robes and white beard became potent advertising symbols. In some countries (such as Latin America and Eastern Europe) the tradition attempts to combine the secular and religious elements by holding that Santa Claus makes children's presents and then gives them to the baby Jesus to distribute.

When Jesus was born does not matter. What matters is why he was born. Cornelia "Corrie" ten Boom once said: "If Jesus were born one thousand times in Bethlehem and not in me, then I would still be lost."

God in the Sciences

The Incarnation: fearfully and wonderfully made

My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth. Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be. Psalm 139:15-16

You began life as a single cell. For a few hours you were a miniscule but highly complex blob of jelly, until it began to divide: two cells, four, eight, sixteen, a ball, a hollow ball, and then something more recognisably like a living organism. You were still tiny, but developing a nervous system, a head, a body, arms and legs.

Until recently I hadn't thought much about Jesus being an embryo. Somehow, I find that thought even more shocking than His birth. How could God, who made the universe, have become something so completely and utterly vulnerable? Maybe in the past, when the development of a child happened in 'secret', it was possible just to let that part of the Christmas story go untold.

Today, when we see images of a developing child, or even embryos outside the womb, it is harder to ignore the process of Jesus developing into a baby. The incarnation meant that God's Son went through all the stages in the diagram in my developmental biology textbook: 'zygote', 'morula', 'blastocyst', implantation, and so on.

Jesus was there in the beginning, and all life owes its existence to Him. But instead of remaining aloof, He chose to become one of us. The Son of God shared the same kind of DNA as every other organism on the planet. He knows what it feels like to have a body, to feel hungry and thirsty, pain and pleasure, dark and light.

In Psalm 139, the writer is meditating on God's intimate knowledge of him, which began when he was an embryo. There is nothing God doesn't know about him, and even darkness cannot obscure him from God's sight. The incarnation means that God's intimacy with us now extends even further. He became one of us, lived alongside us, and shared our very fragile material nature.

The transcendent God is also immanent, longing for us to relate to Him as Father. He became as fragile as we are so He could rescue us from the messes we so often find ourselves in. With His help, we can remember what it means to be fearfully and wonderfully made.



Moving with the times

It used to be said that "Cash is King." But since the covid pandemic more use is made of debit and credit cards than before. Many people now rarely pay for anything with cash or carry much money with them. In common with many other churches and public buildings the PCC has decided to obtain a card-reader machine which will enable visitors to St John's to make donations, **but only if they so wish**, by using a credit or debit card. There will be no pressure put on anyone to use this machine. Worshippers and visitors will not be made to feel uncomfortable. The card-reader will simply be present for those who wish to make donations but who have come to the church without any spare money.

The PCC hopes to have the card-reader available by the start of the Christmas Tree Festival when we expect that there will be many visitors to the church who are not regular worshippers. At a time when all of our bills are increasing dramatically (the church's gas bills are likely to be approximately four times higher than they were last year) the PCC is taking this action in order to give visitors an opportunity to make card donations which will all be extremely welcome. The machine has the ability to record those donations which are eligible for Gift Aid which can add 25% to the value of donations if the donors are tax-payers.


